TOGETHER: Supporting Alumni Through College, Career, And Beyond

Our KIPP Forward team (formerly KIPP Through College) stayed close to our alumni to ensure that they had access to resources as they navigated through the unpredictability of the 2020-21 school year. Nearly \$60,000 in COVID-19 funding allowed our KIPP Forward team to support alumni with technology to enable them to persist in online learning platforms, food provisions to assuage food insecurity, and rent assistance for those experiencing housing instability. Through KIPP's partnership with AYANA therapy, an organization dedicated to providing online mental therapy to marginalized and intersectional communities, the KIPP Forward team was also able to provide mental help support to alumni. Lastly, our KIPP Forward team distributed 80 wellness care packages to current college students through a care package donation drive.



Results AND Financials

OUR 2020-21 ACADEMIC RESULTS

At KIPP Metro Atlanta Schools, over 2/3 of all students remained virtual for the entirety of the 2020-21 school year. Students who were learning virtually were not expected to sit for Georgia Milestones and approximately 12% of all Georgia Milestones tests were taken by qualifying students. Therefore, we do not believe the results from the spring 2021 Georgia Milestones can be used to understand representative trends of proficiency or academic progress for the 2020-21 school year. In addition, the Georgia Department of Education will not calculate a 2021 College and Career Ready Performance Index (CCRPI) summary score for the state, school districts, or schools. We are, however, excited to share the graduation results from our Class of 2021 below.



CLASS OF 2021 COLLEGE ACCEPTANCES


